## **THE BOARD OF DEPUTIES OF BRITISH JEWS.**

---

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1934.

---

### INTRODUCTION.

The work of the Board during 1934 continued to be dominated by the disaster which had overtaken the Jews in Germany. The second year of the National-Socialist régime provided an opportunity for a clearer survey of the Jewish situation in that country as affected by racial legislation and the Nazi Government's general anti-Jewish policy. The result of that survey, which is more fully dealt with in the subsequent Report of the Joint Foreign Committee, shows clearly that there has been no real relaxation of the rigour of official persecution and discrimination, even though there may have been some mitigation of the grosser forms of cruelty associated with the concentration camps and prison administration. The lot of our Jewish brethren in the villages and smaller towns has become steadily more and more unbearable, and the licence so freely accorded to rabid anti-Semites of the type of Herr Streicher, in Franconia, in their malignant and unscrupulous efforts to inflame the passions of the mob against their Jewish fellow-citizens is but typical of the present policy of the Hitler régime. The adverse reactions of this policy on the position of Jews

in other countries, especially where economic conditions were by no means favourable, created fresh problems requiring the unremitting attention of the Board and the Joint Foreign Committee. The German example was not without its effect on certain elements in this country, although anti-Jewish propaganda here, which was instigated and supported by an insignificant minority, received no encouragement from the responsible organs of the Press or leaders of public opinion.

Details of the Board's work are given in the Reports of the Committees which follow.

## ADMINISTRATION.

### THE TRIENNIAL ELECTION OF DEPUTIES.

The session 1931-34 came to an end in April. The triennial elections showed an increase in the number of Congregations and Institutions sending representatives to the Board. At March 1st, 1935, there were 347 Deputies representing 89 London Synagogues, 126 Provincial Congregations, 9 Colonial Congregations and 15 Institutions. The corresponding figures at the end of the last session (April, 1934) were 325 Deputies representing 89 London Synagogues, 122 Provincial Congregations, 9 Colonial Congregations and 14 Institutions.

### HONORARY OFFICERS AND CHAIRMEN OF COMMITTEES.

Mr. Neville J. Laski, K.C., was re-elected President; Sir Isidore Salmon, C.B.E., D.L., M.P., was re-elected

Vice-President; Mr. Lionel L. Cohen, K.C., was elected Vice-President, and Mr. M. Gordon Liverman, J.P., was re-elected Treasurer.

The Law, Parliamentary and General Purposes Committee elected Mr. B. A. Levinson as its Chairman.

#### OBITUARY.

The Board suffered the loss by death during the year of Mr. E. L. Mocatta, Deputy for the Spanish and Portuguese Synagogue since 1902; Mr. Harry R. Lewis, Deputy for the Anglo-Jewish Association from 1922 to 1928 and, at his death, representative of the Anglo-Jewish Association on the Joint Foreign Committee; Mr. Samuel Moses, Deputy from 1901, first for the Hampstead and later for the United Synagogue; Mr. G. S. Wigoder, Deputy for the Dublin United Hebrew Congregation from 1913 to 1916; Mr. Abraham Class, Deputy for the Great Garden Street Synagogue since 1928; Mr. Samuel J. Cohen, Deputy for the New Kahal Chassidim Synagogue, Manchester, since 1925; and Mr. James Rossdale, Deputy for the New West End Synagogue since 1915.

The Board also passed votes of condolence on the death of Dr. Victor Jacobson, Chaim Nachman Bjalik, Rabbi Yoffey of Manchester, Baron Edmund de Rothschild, Mr. Johan Kremenetsky and Dr. Mushcat.

#### VOTES OF CONGRATULATION.

The Board had occasion during the year to congratulate Sir Osmond d'Avigdor-Goldsmid on the conferment of

a Baronetcy, and later on his election as President of the J.C.A.; Miss Nettie Adler on the conferment of the C.B.E.; Mr. Lionel L. Cohen, K.C., who was elected a Bencher of Lincoln's Inn; the Marquis of Reading, who was appointed Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports; Mr. M. H. Davis, Alderman S. Bolsom and Dr. Bernard Homa, who were elected members of the London County Council; Mr. L. Hore-Belisha on his appointment as Minister of Transport; Sir Meyer and Lady Spielman on the celebration of their golden wedding; and Miss Miriam Moses and Alderman A. Kershaw on their election as Aldermen of the Borough of Stepney.

#### CERTIFICATION OF MARRIAGE SECRETARIES.

The President, in the exercise of his statutory duty, certified a number of appointments of Secretaries (for Marriages) of Synagogues to the Registrar-General. The following Synagogues appointed Marriage Secretaries for the first time:—

## SHOCHETIM.

The President, in virtue of the L.C.C. Bye-laws, issued annual certificates to Shochetim licensed by the Ecclesiastical Authorities exercising their functions within the Administrative County of London.

## COMMITTEE ON ADMINISTRATION.

The Special Committee on Administration set up by the Board in October, 1933, under the Chairmanship of Mr. S. Rowson, issued its Report in March, 1934. The Report and the recommendations embodied therein were considered by the Board at its meetings on July 1st and 15th. These recommendations and the resolutions based on them which were adopted by the Board are given in the Appendix.

The Committee on Reorganisation set up in pursuance of the above-mentioned resolutions had not reported when the year closed.

## THE SECRETARIAT.

Mr. B. A. Zaiman resigned from the Secretaryship of the Board and the Joint Foreign Committee after an association dating from January, 1931. The resignation was accepted with regret and took effect on July 19th, 1934. No new appointment had been made by the end of the year. Mr. A. G. Brotman, the Assistant Secretary, has been in charge of the office in the meantime.

LAW, PARLIAMENTARY AND GENERAL  
PURPOSES COMMITTEE.

BILLS IN PARLIAMENT.

The Alien Manufacturers' Licensing Bill and the Shops (Sunday Trading Restrictions) (Scotland) Bill, which had been introduced in the opening month of the Parliamentary Session, 1933-34, were dropped. The Expiring Laws Continuance Bill is referred to in the Report of the Aliens' Committee.

MARRIAGE SECRETARIES.

In consequence of a number of breaches of Statutory duties on the part of Marriage Secretaries, to which the Registrar-General drew the Board's attention, the Committee, with the approval of the Registrar-General, issued an appropriate circular to all Marriage Secretaries indicating the type of irregularities met with, the necessity for strict observance of the duties which the law imposed on Marriage Secretaries, and the importance of consultation with the local Superintendent Registrar in all cases of doubt and difficulty. Such consultation was subsequently made a condition for the certification of the appointment of a Marriage Secretary by the President.

TRUSTEES.

Sir O. E. d'Avigdor-Goldsmid, Bart., the Rt. Hon. Lord Rothschild, F.R.S., and Mr. M. Gordon Liverman, J.P., were appointed Trustees for the Board; and Sir

O. E. d'Avigdor-Goldsmid, Bart., Mr. Harry R. Lewis and Mr. A. S. Diamond, Trustees for the Morocco Relief Fund, in respect of investments approved by the Board at the end of 1933.

#### STATISTICAL BUREAU.

The Committee considered a letter and memorandum circulated by the Statistical Bureau Conference set up by the Jewish Health Organisation, inviting financial support towards the establishment of a Jewish Statistical Bureau. The object of the Conference was welcomed in so far as it aimed at a scientific basis for statistics of utility relating to the Jewish community, but the Committee could not recommend financial support by the Board.

#### HAIRDRESSERS' AND BARBERS' SHOPS

(SUNDAY CLOSING) ACT, 1930.

The Committee was called upon to consider several complaints of abuse and evasion of Section 3 of the Act on the part of Jewish barbers and hairdressers who, in accordance with that Section, had obtained permission to carry on business on Sunday instead of Saturday. The nature of the complaints, their implications and possible consequences, were brought to the attention of the proprietors of establishments concerned, both by letter early in the year and at a meeting called in December at the instance of the Committee. As a result of

the meeting, the Committee recommended that (1) no encouragement should be given to the movement referred to at the meeting for the repeal of Section 3; (2) no initiative be taken to effect an amendment of it; but (3) if a proposal for an amendment came from any quarter, the Board should maintain the principle that the concession was in the interests of those Jews whose real concern was the observance of the Sabbath—and no others—and should support, oppose, or endeavour to alter any such proposed amendment accordingly. A Sub-Committee was appointed to watch and deal with any developments in the matter.

#### SUNDAY CLOSING.

The principle underlying the last-mentioned recommendation governed the Committee's attitude towards such proposals for Sunday closing legislation as have from time to time been put forward by the baking and other trades.

#### JEWISH BAKERS.

Representatives of the Jewish Master Bakers' Protection Society and the Jewish Bakers' Union met at the invitation of the Committee, and agreed to recommend to their executives the appointment of a Joint Committee, under a Chairman to be appointed by the President of the Board, to which Committee were to be referred all questions and differences between the two bodies representing employers and employed respectively.

## TIMES OF BOARD MEETINGS.

The suitability of the times fixed for Board meetings was made the subject of a postal enquiry to members of the Board. In accordance with the result of the enquiry, the Board recommended that the present arrangements be maintained, that is, morning meetings in the winter (October to April inclusive) and afternoon meetings in the summer (May to July inclusive).

## JEWISH CHARITIES.

The Committee, having had its attention drawn to the criticism that might be made against charities whose finances and accounts were not adequately controlled and audited, recommended the publication in the Jewish Press, and later the circulation to all Jewish charities, of a letter advocating the employment of professional auditors. The letter, signed by the Chief Rabbi, the President of the Board, the President of the Board of Guardians and the Chairman of the Central British Fund for German Jewry, has led to the desired action being taken by a number of charities.

## DISUSED CEMETERIES.

An agreement was made with the Yarmouth Corporation whereby in consideration of an initial payment by the Board and a fixed annual charge, the Corporation undertook the maintenance of the Jewish disused cemetery in Yarmouth.

The Committee desires to tender its thanks to Mr. H. B. Cohen and Mr. Ralph Lyons, the Board's Honorary Inspectors, who have from time to time reported on the condition of the cemeteries under its surveillance and to Mr. A. Goldstine, who acted as honorary surveyor in connection with repairs carried out at the Bancroft Road Cemetery.

### JOINT FOREIGN COMMITTEE.

#### GERMANY.

Throughout the year 1934 the policy of reducing the Jews to the status of aliens whose presence is merely tolerated in the land of their birth was steadily pursued by the National Socialist Government. The total exclusion of Jews from the professions has not yet been achieved owing to the fact that so very large a proportion of Jewish lawyers and doctors were able to prove that they had been fighting in the front line during the War. As a result, however, of anti-Jewish legislation the number of Jewish students at the Universities has fallen from something over 3,000 to something over 300. Except for those who are able to pursue their studies abroad, the Jews in Germany find themselves completely deprived of University education, even at those seats of learning which owe their very existence to Jewish benefactions. Throughout the year the process of disintegration which affected the smaller provincial communities in 1933 was continued. The country towns and villages have been deserted by the younger generation, who have either emigrated or sought to find new means of exist-

ence in the larger towns. Among the smaller Jewish communities several instances have been reported where there were no children of school age, and many more where there was a wholly disproportionate number of people of middle age or of advanced years. The Central Committee for Welfare and Reconstruction has continued to make strenuous efforts to grapple with immense difficulties. Future employment for the Jewish youth which remains in Germany depends largely on the continued existence of small Jewish shop-keepers and tradesmen. Accordingly a system of loan banks has been organised in order to lend support to the small employers of labour whose economic existence is imperilled.

Efforts have also been made to provide fresh Jewish schools both for the sake of the pupils and also in order to absorb a certain number of Jewish teachers who have been dismissed from their employment in the State schools. By the creation of the Kulturbund, some attempt has been made to provide the Jewish community with theatrical performances, lectures and concerts, of which they have been deprived. The Kulturbund's activities also provide some opportunity for employment to Jewish performers who are prevented from appearing at any German theatre or concert hall. All these efforts meet continually with hindrances created by local party or Government officials.

#### REFUGEES FROM GERMANY.

Under the guidance of Mr. James MacDonald, the High Commissioner for Refugees coming from Germany, the work of re-settlement continued to make headway

against considerable difficulties. Reports received from the High Commission and from Mr. Neville Laski, the representative of Anglo-Jewish organisations on its Bureau and Advisory Council, indicated that over 70,000 refugees have had to be considered, and that of these, about one-fifth were non-Jews. Of the total number, about one-half have been actually settled—Palestine alone accounting for over 20,000—and the remainder have obtained temporary refuge in France, Poland, Czechoslovakia and other European countries. World-wide economic depression and unemployment have been responsible for the reluctance of most countries to admit refugees for permanent settlement, and for the poor financial support from all but the Jewish communities to the work of the High Commission. Though much has been done, the time has, unfortunately, not yet come to desist from further endeavours. Indeed, the re-union of the Saar with Germany raises a further problem of refugees that may add to the already heavy obligations which the Jews in this and other countries have been called upon to bear.

#### THE SAAR.

In view of the fate which had overtaken the Jews in Nazi Germany, the prospect of the union of the Saar with the Reich was not one which could be contemplated with equanimity as far as the smaller Jewish community in that territory was concerned. The Committee of Three appointed by the League to arrange the plebiscite in the Saar was able, prior to that event, fixed for January 13th,

1935, to bring about an agreement between France and Germany whereby the latter undertook, should the plebiscite result in her favour, not to discriminate against the inhabitants of the Saar on account of race, language or religion. As the undertaking, however, was limited to a period of one year only after the plebiscite, it did little to allay the anxiety felt for the future of the Jews in that district.

#### AUSTRIA.

1934 proved a most unhappy year for Austria. A Socialist revolt in February, suppressed only after considerable bloodshed, was followed by an abortive Nazi " Putsch " in July, in which the Chancellor, Dr. Dollfuss, was murdered, and which created a state of tension and fear for the peace of Europe. Fortunately, as a result of the strong stand taken by the Western European Powers—notably Italy—for the independence of Austria, the danger of a Nazi régime in the latter country was temporarily averted.

Three months prior to Dr. Dollfuss's assassination a new constitution had been promulgated for the building up of a " Christian German Federal State on corporative foundations." Although the new constitution maintained the equality of civic and religious rights which Jews had enjoyed under the Republic, its interpretation by the authorities responsible for its administration gave grounds for legitimate complaint, particularly in the case of Jewish members of the professions and " brain workers " generally, who had been dismissed from public employment and were virtually debarred from re-entry.

## POLAND AND DANZIG.

The serious economic position of Polish Jewry showed no signs of improvement—indeed, various legislative enactments tended to its aggravation, especially in regard to Jewish traders and artisans.

Politically, the rise of a new anti-Semitic National Radical Party, with aims modelled on the Nazi programme, created a fresh danger to the community. Its violent methods, which did not stop short of physical attack, led after a time to its suppression by the Government. The powerful National Democratic Party still maintains its anti-Semitic policy unchecked to any material extent by the Government; restrictive action by the Government is, however, hoped for, in spite of the growing accord between Germany and Poland.

In Danzig, the Jews are subjected to conditions only slightly better than those in Germany. Although they have *de jure* equality of rights, the all-powerful influence of the Nazi Party and a preponderantly Nazi Senate has made the lot of the 8,000 Jewish inhabitants very difficult to bear, harassed as they are by the unscrupulous propaganda of the Nazi Press and secret boycott methods.

## THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS AND MINORITIES.

The announcement that the Polish Government intended to re-open the question of the Minorities Treaties at the League of Nations Assembly, and their proposal that an International Commission should be summoned

to discuss the extension of these Treaties to all countries, aroused considerable interest and some anxiety prior to the Assembly. This interest was enhanced when, at the opening session of the Assembly, Colonel Beck, the Polish Foreign Minister, stated that his Government could no longer co-operate with the League of Nations in questions concerning minorities. This attitude, taken in many authoritative quarters to indicate a unilateral repudiation of the Minorities Treaty, to which Poland was a party, was received with marked disapproval in the Assembly and unmistakably condemned in speeches by the representatives of Great Britain and France, among others. Although Poland's proposal for the generalisation of the Minorities Treaties was later withdrawn in the Vith Commission, her actual position in regard to her obligations under the Minorities Treaty still remains somewhat obscure.

#### ROUMANIA.

The Jews, in common with other minorities, view with considerable apprehension a recent law which stipulates that at least 80 per cent. of the personnel engaged in economic, industrial, commercial and civil employment must be of "Roumanian origin," and which thus only permits 20 per cent. of persons of alien origin to be employed. This division, although not ostensibly based on racial theories, is held by the anti-Semitic parties to be a triumph for the Hitlerist views which they have adopted. If rigorously administered, the law is bound to have the effect of depriving thousands of Jewish

officials and artisans of their right to work. The Jewish community is naturally making a vigorous stand against the enactment, but it is not yet possible to say with what success.

Mr. Neville Laski was in Geneva during the Session of the League Assembly in September, 1934. His reports of a journey made during the summer to Austria, Poland and Danzig were circulated, and aroused much interest.

#### ALIENS COMMITTEE.

Questions concerning aliens were raised on a number of occasions in Parliament, but, by the passing of the Expiring Laws Continuance (No. 2) Act, 1933, for a further period of one year, no change was made in the powers given by the Act to the Home Secretary in regard to the admission, registration and deportation of aliens.

The Committee was privileged on several occasions to receive personal reports from Mr. Otto M. Schiff, O.B.E., on the work of the Refugee Committee, and desires to record its appreciation of the constructive work carried out under his guidance.

The Advisory Committee for the Admission of Ecclesiastical Officials, on which the Aliens Committee is represented, received and dealt with a number of applications. Although its work was becoming increasingly known among the Congregations in this country it was

found necessary, however, again to draw attention to the advisability of making applications through that Committee and not direct to the authorities.

The assistance of the Committee was requested in a number of individual cases and such advice and help was given as was appropriate to the circumstances.

#### EDUCATION COMMITTEE.

Reports on the English teaching at the Tangier Schools were received both from the teacher, Mr. H. N. Pollen, and from a prominent local resident who had, at the request of the Committee, been good enough to take a special interest in the English teaching provided. The Committee learnt with appreciation that the progress in the Schools was well maintained and that the standard of English attained at the end of the school course was sufficient to afford a valuable qualification for pupils who sought employment in commercial and public undertakings.

The Committee was called upon to consider views publicly expressed at a Religious Education Conference, implying that the alleged prevalence of anti-Jewish feeling among school children might be attributed to the widespread use of "The Merchant of Venice" as the first Shakespearian play to be studied in Elementary Schools. The Committee formed the opinion that the evidence that could be adduced in support of these views was of too indefinite a character to warrant action. It

undertook, however, to watch carefully the matter raised.

The Committee dealt satisfactorily with a number of individual cases in which its assistance was sought. The majority of these were concerned with arrangements for Jewish candidates who desired to have alternative papers for such as had been set for a Saturday or Jewish Holyday.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE.

The assessment levied in the first half year of the new Session showed a noteworthy increase on that of the preceding Session. This increase, and the reduction on salary expenditure consequent on the resignation of the Secretary, combined to produce a surplus of nearly £400 for the half year ending October 28th, 1934.

Increases in salary were granted to the Board's staff towards the end of the year, and schemes of pensions and scales of incremental increases of salaries were given preliminary consideration. These questions, however, and others affecting the staff were held in suspense in view of the setting up of the Committee on Reorganisation.

The Committee dealt with several applications for remission or reduction of assessment and also took steps to secure a reduction in the arrears outstanding for the past Session.

## FOREIGN APPEALS COMMITTEE.

The Committee met on one occasion, prior to the Triennial Election in May, to consider an appeal for the relief of Boukharian Jewish refugees in Afghanistan and Persia. A grant of £100 was made from the Foreign Appeals Fund for the purpose and was remitted to Afghanistan. It was also reported that an additional sum of £500 had been collected from private sources of which £300 had been remitted to Afghanistan and £200 to Persia.

In order to facilitate the exemption of the income of the Fund from income tax, the resolution of the Board dated July 25th, 1926, setting up the Committee, was amended by the addition of the words: "for the relief of distress," and now reads:—

"That a Committee of the Board be set up for the purpose of receiving, considering and dealing with foreign appeals for the relief of distress."

## PALESTINE COMMITTEE.

The continuing economic expansion in Palestine, accompanied by a growing but unsatisfied demand for labour, raised expectations that the Government would relax its restricted estimates of absorptive capacity, and by granting adequate immigration schedules assist the further and balanced development of the country. The actual schedules granted were, however, disappointing, especially in view of the urgent need for settling German refugees and the distressed Jewish population in Eastern

Europe, and the Board, on the recommendation of the Committee, decided to make representations on the subject to the Colonial Office. On June 28th a Deputation consisting of the President, the Chairman, Sir Osmond d'Avigdor-Goldsmid, Bart., and Sir Isidore Salmon, M.P., waited on the Secretary of State for the Colonies and presented a memorandum embodying its views. Following the interview, an agreed Report was circulated in which the Secretary of State indicated that the Board's views would be communicated to the High Commissioner in Palestine. Later in the year a supplementary grant of 1,200 certificates was made, but the position resulting from the shortage of labour was not materially improved. There were, however, indications that the Government was showing increasing understanding of the real importance underlying Jewish effort in Palestine.

Following upon the decision taken by the Board at the end of 1933, a Conference of representative Jewish bodies was held in February and again in December of the year under review, to consider the problems arising out of missionary activities in Palestine with a view to formulating, if possible, constructive measures for minimising the effects of such activities upon Jewish children. In addition to the Board, the following bodies sent representatives to the Conference: Agudath Yisroel, Anglo-Jewish Association, Association of Jewish Friendly Societies, B'nai B'rith (Grand Lodge of England), Federation of Synagogues, Federation of Women Zionists, Jewish Agency for Palestine, Union of Jewish Women, the Women's International Zionist Organisation

(W.I.Z.O.), and Zionist Federation of Great Britain and Ireland. The Conference had not completed its examination of the problem when the year closed.

#### PRESS AND INFORMATION COMMITTEE

In spite of sustained efforts by Nazi propagandists in this country to justify the persecution of Jews in Germany and to arouse ill-feeling against Jews generally, the British press on the whole gave little encouragement to their campaign or to that of like-minded elements in this country.

The defamatory statements with which the Committee was called upon to deal occurred generally in newspapers and periodicals of minor importance, and in nearly all cases betrayed a common source—foreign to British tradition both in origin and spirit.

Informatory pamphlets and reprints from authoritative journals were issued during the year and proved of value in keeping the public both at home and overseas accurately informed on the situation of the Jews in Germany.

The Central Jewish Lecture Committee working under the joint auspices of the Press and Information Committee and the B'nai B'rith continued to supply speakers on Jewish subjects and issued periodical reports indicative of its valuable work.

The Committee feels that with the provision of adequate financial resources its work can be usefully extended.

## SHECHITA COMMITTEE.

The Committee's endeavours to bring about a universal installation of an approved casting apparatus wherever Shechita is practised in this country were steadily pursued during 1934, the first year of operation of the Slaughter of Animals Act. On the representation of the Chairman of the Committee, the Rabbinical Commission for the Licensing of Shochetim adopted a recommendation that licenses should only be granted to Shochetim employed by communities where pens had been installed or were about to be installed, and further, in order to avoid the undesirable practice of licensed Shochetim acting for opposition butchers, that licenses granted to them should be valid only in places for which they had been granted. At the end of the year it was satisfactory to record that approved pens had been installed in 28 provincial centres and that negotiations were being carried on in the few localities still unprovided with pens with every prospect of success. In the case of the smaller communities which for financial or other reasons were unable to instal casting apparatus, arrangements were made whereby they could use the pens of neighbouring communities, or obtain their supplies of meat there.

Perhaps the most satisfactory evidence of the efficacy of the Committee's work was shown in the practically complete cessation of attacks against Shechita during the last few months of the year. The Committee's task in furthering the general use of casting pens and the adjustment of financial and other questions involved,

necessitated a number of personal visits to provincial centres on the part of its Chairman.

The method adopted in this country to remove grounds for criticism against the Jewish method of slaughter raised a good deal of interest in the Colonies and foreign countries, as was shown by the number of enquiries addressed to the Committee. As a result of the information supplied, several communities in the Colonies—Cape Town for example—have installed pens with satisfactory results.

In the early part of the year there were some attacks upon Shechita in the press to which replies were made by Mr. C. H. L. Emanuel, Honorary Secretary of the Committee. The Board is much indebted to him for his services.

## APPENDIX.

### RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED BY THE BOARD IN CONNECTION WITH THE REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COMMITTEE ON ADMINISTRATION.

#### *Original Recommendations.*

I. That the work of the Board should be divided into two departments, dealing with (a) home, and (b) foreign affairs, respectively, with independent Secretaries.

II. A Committee of the Board should be set up to advise on the reorganisation of its offices.

III. The President shall be entitled to the use of his own office and the services of a personal private Secretary.

IX. The financial clauses in the Constitution should be amended as suggested in this Report.

#### *Resolutions Adopted by the Board.*

1. That the work of the Board be divided into two departments, dealing with (a) home, and (b) foreign affairs, respectively, and that it be an instruction to the Committee to be appointed in pursuance of Recommendation II. that in drafting the alterations to the Constitution, to frame them in such a manner that the arrangement contemplated by Recommendation I. can be varied at any time if circumstances alter. (Adopted July 1st.)

2. That a Committee be appointed in pursuance of Recommendation II. to consider and report on Recommendations III. and IX. and the steps, constitutionally and financially necessary, to give effect to these and other Recommendations that may be approved by the Board; the Committee in question to consist of:—

IV. The duties of Chairman of the ordinary Meetings of the Board shall be performed in future by a person other than the President.

V. An Executive Committee shall be set up, consisting of the Hon. Officers, the Chairman of the Law and Parliamentary Committee, the Anglo-Jewish Association Chairman of the Joint Foreign Committee, the Chairman of the Press and Information Committee, and two additional members elected by the Board.

VI. The Chairman of the Law and Parliamentary Committee should have the status of Hon. Officer and be a member of the Executive Committee.

VII. The Concordat in foreign affairs between the Board and the Anglo-Jewish Association should not be disturbed.

VIII. A paid Secretary with journalistic capacity and experience should be appointed to the Press and Information Committee.

4. That Recommendation IV. be not accepted, but that the By-laws be altered so as to enable the President to vacate the Chair in favour of one of the other Hon. Officers whenever he thinks it desirable to do so. (Adopted July 1st.)

5. (Original Recommendation adopted, July 1st.)

6. That in addition to the Chairman of the Law, Parliamentary and General Purposes Committee, the Chairman of the Press and Information Committee should also be an Hon. Officer of the Board, and that both should be members of the Executive Committee. (Adopted July 15th.)
